From Montgomery The History of a Town

"An important bit of country life history as related by Dr Keelan's daughter, Agatha Keelan Blodgett.

In 1905 Daniel Keelan arrived in Montgomery to be the doctor for the Town and surrounding areas. He ministered to the townspeople for forty-four years. As was the case for country doctors in those days, he advised and nutured the spirit as wellas the body of whole families. He had his finger on the pulse of three generations of residents and is still remembered fondly by today's only citizens."
